REGULAR SESSION CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Uhring called the meeting to order at 6:38 p.m.

Terri Davis led the Pledge of Allegiance.

CLOSED SESSION REPORT

Interim City Attorney Rusin reported that the meeting convened at 5:30 p.m., after which time the City Council recessed to a Closed Session pursuant to Government Code Section 54956.8, with Mayor Uhring and Councilmembers Grisanti, Riggins, and Silverstein present; and Mayor Pro Tem Stewart arrived at 6:00 p.m. He stated the Council discussed the items on the Closed Session agenda and took no reportable action.

REPORT ON POSTING OF AGENDA

City Clerk Pettijohn reported that the agenda for the meeting was properly posted on April 12, 2024.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

MOTION Councilmember Riggins moved, and Councilmember Grisanti seconded a motion to approve the agenda. The motion carried unanimously.

ITEM 1 CEREMONIAL/PRESENTATIONS

- A. Presentation of City Tile to Parker Davis for Seven Years of Service to the City of Malibu

Mayor Uhring presented the City Tile to Media Technician Davis.

Media Technician Davis thanked the Council for the recognition.

- B. Proclamation Declaring April 21-27, 2024 National Volunteer Week

Mayor Uhring and Public Safety Director Dueñas presented the proclamation to members of the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT), Arson Watch, and Volunteers on Patrol (VOP).

- C. Presentation on the City of Malibu's New Development Application Portal

Environmental Sustainability Director Bundy and Planning Director Mollica presented on the new development application submittal and tracking portal available through the City's website.

The Council thanked staff for the presentation and their work on the portal.

ITEM 2.A. PUBLIC COMMENTS

Kay Gabbard congratulated Media Technician Davis. She discussed the death of Russell McMonigle on Zuma Beach. She discussed the People Concern's homeless outreach workers who assisted Mr. McMonigle and thanked everyone who supported individuals experiencing homelessness in the City.

Brennan Lindner stated the Zuma Foundation Triathlon had not opened registration for the 2024 triathlon and expressed concern about its operations. He stated Super League Triathlon remained committed to the Malibu Triathlon and raising funds for Childrens Hospital Los Angeles and Malibu based non-profits. He stated Super League was interested in holding the triathlon in 2025 if the Zuma Foundation did not hold the event in 2024.

Tim Pera, Mountains Recreation and Conservation Authority (MRCA) Ranger, provided a Ranger activity report for the last month. He stated 243 citations were issued for parking violations. He stated extended patrols were scheduled for public safety and illegal parking issues and no service calls were generated. He stated two new rangers were hired for the coastal region. He thanked Public Safety Liaison Flores for informing MRCA of the illegal wooden structure near 25499 Pacific Coast Highway (PCH). He stated patrols were implemented at Malibu Bluffs and beach access areas due to possible encampments. He stated two citations were issued for possession of alcohol at Lechuza Beach and two citations were issued for dogs off-leash at Escondido Trail.

Julie Blunden discussed Cavalleri Road and the blind left turn onto PCH. She requested the City help in conversations with Caltrans about mitigation.

Norm Haynie thanked the Council for its work on PCH safety. He thanked Mayor Pro Tem Stewart and City Manager McClary for their efforts in Sacramento to push for speed cameras and other safety mechanisms on PCH.

Scott Dittrich discussed the Sheriff's Department Beach Team and stated the City should not need to pay for the Sheriff's Department to patrol the County's beach. He asked about the permit status of the communication tower at Santa Monica College (SMC) Malibu Campus.

Kai Kater, Amir Rosenbaum, and Roman Basteched were not present at the time of the hearing.

Jo Drummond congratulated Media Technician Davis. She thanked the community's volunteers for their service. She announced an art show on April 24, 2024 at Malibu High School (MHS), the Mean Girls musical at MHS, and a screening of *21 Miles in Malibu*. She stated the permit for her deck had been

approved.

Harold requested the City adopt a resolution to become a second amendment sanctuary city.

Andy Lyon questioned if 600 Spring LLC had paid the \$150,000 required in the settlement agreement. He questioned how the City Attorney was able to clarify a motion with a Councilmember after the meeting where the motion was made. He stated 600 Spring LLC was expanding beyond its rental space on the City's property.

Judy Stroyer was not present at the time of the hearing.

ITEM 2.B. COMMISSION / COMMITTEE / CITY MANAGER UPDATES

City Manager McClary stated Public Works Director DuBoux had reached out to Ms. Blunden about the left turn at Cavalleri Road. He stated the California Highway Patrol (CHP) Malibu Taskforce has issued 199 citations, 180 for speeding and 19 for other factors. He stated the California Office of Traffic Safety had secured 31 digital billboards in Southern California to encourage the public to drive slowly on PCH. He stated Caltrans announced Topanga Canyon would be closed through Fall 2024. He stated City representatives went to Sacramento to support traffic safety bills, SB 1297 and SB 1509. He announced the State of the City on May 10, 2024 at the SMC-Malibu Campus. He announced the launch of the community outreach project for the use of the City's vacant land.

Community Services Director Riesgo discussed the Bluff's Park Sidewalk Repair Project and stated the work was estimated to be complete in four weeks.

Planning Director Mollica stated SMC had applied for a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) and a variance for height for the communications tower. He stated the application had been reviewed by the City's wireless consultant and would be scheduled for a publicly noticed Planning Commission hearing.

In response to Mayor Pro Tem Stewart, Planning Director Mollica stated SMC had agreed to repaint the tower a more natural color.

City Manager McClary stated the City had filed a petition for review of final agency action related to the new flight paths at LAX.

In response to Councilmember Riggins, Community Services Director Riesgo stated staff met with the City's skatepark design consultants and they were finalizing materials for the plan check process. She stated the Parks and Recreation Commission had discussed ideas for fundraising.

Sergeant Chris Soderlund, Los Angeles County Sheriff Department, discussed an incident where an individual experiencing homelessness broke into a house and was

arrested. He discussed the death of Mr. McMonigle due to a medical emergency. He discussed a burglary on Malibu Road on April 11, 2024 that involved the theft of a car. He encouraged the public to lock their doors and their cars. He discussed an incident on April 12, 2024, where an intoxicated individual rammed a gate, a Tesla, and a fence before the car was disabled. He discussed a DUI arrest on PCH near Carbon Canyon on April 19, 2024. He discussed a traffic enforcement saturation procedure on April 19, 2024. He reported 41 citations were issued, 21 for speed, and two arrested for reckless driving, during the exercise. He reported on 2024 crime statistics and stated 16 people had been arrested for reckless driving, and 24 arrested for DUI. He stated Sheriff Department staff would be at MHS each day next week to host safe driving education activities. He discussed Deputy Alfredo Flores's death due to injuries sustained from an explosion while qualifying at a mobile gun range. He discussed the shooting of a Century Station motorcycle officer on the freeway near West Covina and reported that his bullet proof vest saved his life.

In response to Councilmember Silverstein, Sergeant Soderlund stated most individuals arrested for reckless driving had not yet injured or killed anyone so they would not be charged with murder. He stated there were mitigating factors that lead to the charges in the crash that killed the four Pepperdine students.

ITEM 2.C. SUBCOMMITTEE REPORTS / COUNCIL COMMENTS

Councilmember Grisanti stated he attended one of the development application portal presentations. He stated he attended two Malibu-Las Virgenes Council of Governments (COG) meetings, including one at the location of the new wildlife undercrossing.

Mayor Uhring addressed Mr. and Ms. Blunden and stated he would be in touch with them.

Councilmember Grisanti stated he attended the League of California Cities City Leaders Summit in Sacramento with Councilmember Riggins and she met with Assemblymember Jacqui Irwin. He stated he attended the public outreach meeting for the proposed school district separation revenue sharing agreement.

Councilmember Riggins stated she attended the League of California Cities City Leaders Summit in Sacramento and met with Assemblymember Jacqui Irwin and Senator Ben Allen. She stated she attended the Rosanna Xia Library Speaker Series event. She thanked Ms. Gabbard for reminding people about the humanity of individuals experiencing homelessness. She stated the City's Budget Workshop would be held Wednesday night and the Beach Team budget could be discussed at that meeting. She stated she attended the public outreach meeting for the proposed school district separation revenue sharing agreement.

In response to Councilmember Riggins, Ranger Pera stated the two new rangers would cover the coastal area and the Mullholland corridor. He stated staffing was

increased on weekends when more visitors were expected. He stated maintenance personnel were working in the field everyday to clear trash. He stated there was higher staffing at the Escondido Trail on the weekends.

Councilmember Riggins thanked Planning and Environmental Sustainability staff for their work on the development application portal.

Councilmember Silverstein thanked speakers and those who submitted written comments. He stated he attended an Administration and Finance Subcommittee meeting to discuss the fee schedule. He stated he attended a meeting with Councilmember Grisanti, City Manager McClary, and Supervisor Horvath's staff to discuss Camp Kilpatrick. He stated he attended part of the public outreach meeting for the proposed school district separation revenue sharing agreement, but there was very little public turnout. He stated he attended a meeting with Mayor Uhring at Pepperdine to discuss how to improve safety on Malibu Roads. He discussed a reckless driving incident he witnessed from a Pepperdine student. He stated he listened to the Supreme Court arguments for the Grants Pass v. Johnson case and discussed the case.

Mayor Pro Tem Stewart stated he went to Sacramento to speak to the Transportation Committee. He thanked Senator Ben Allen, the City's lobbyist California Strategies, public speakers, City Manager McClary, Deputy City Manager Brown, and Pepperdine's lobbyist for their work supporting speed camera bill. He stated the bill passed out of committee with a 14-1 vote. He stated the bill still had to go through the State Assembly and it would be challenging. He stated he attended an Administration and Finance Subcommittee meeting to discuss the fee schedule. He stated he attended the public outreach meeting for the proposed school district separation revenue sharing agreement. He stated he attended the COG meeting at the wildlife crossing and a COG meeting at City Hall to discuss homelessness with Supervisor Horvath. He discussed insurance companies not renewing home insurance policies and expressed concern that individuals who were uninsured or underinsured in a fire would feel that they had to defend their home from the fire. He discussed the evacuation challenges for Topanga residents while Topanga was closed at PCH for several months. He discussed The Malibu Times article reporting that Congressman Brad Sherman was including funding in the federal budget for MRCA to purchase property in the City of Malibu. He stated the City of Malibu was very interested in purchasing land for parks.

CONSENSUS

By consensus, the Council directed staff to bring back an item to consider sending a letter to Congressman Brad Sherman regarding the purchase of land for parks.

Mayor Pro Tem Stewart stated the Council's goal was to get a skatepark built and stated Mr. Lyon's comments were not accurate.

Mayor Uhring stated he met with Nichole Taylor from Pepperdine to discuss what can be done about speeding on PCH. He discussed Pepperdine's disciplinary

process for students who violated the law. He stated he attended an Environmental Sustainability Subcommittee meeting and commended the Environmental Sustainability staff for their work. He stated he briefly the public outreach meeting for the proposed school district separation revenue sharing agreement. He encouraged the public to watch the revenue sharing presentation on YouTube. He stated he had heard concerns from the public that the vacant land survey was requesting too much personal information and recommended the consultant add a disclaimer that the information will not be used beyond the City's survey. He discussed the City of Lancaster's lawsuit against the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department.

In response to Mayor Uhring, City Manager McClary stated the city was monitoring the lawsuit. He explained that the City of Lancaster was contending that they were not receiving the exact services they were paying for.

ITEM 3 CONSENT CALENDAR
